

HOSPITALITY

The Christian practice of hospitality is rooted in the teachings of Jesus Christ and exemplified throughout the Bible. At its core, hospitality is the intentional act of welcoming and caring for others with warmth, generosity, and love. 
Day 38: A Reflection of God's Love

READ: 1 Peter 4:10-11 "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ."

THINK: As followers of Christ, we are called to be good stewards of God's grace, and one powerful way to do that is through the practice of hospitality.

1 Peter 4:10-11 reminds us that each of us has been uniquely gifted to serve others. Whether it is through words of encouragement, acts of kindness, or providing a welcoming space for others, we have the opportunity to extend God's love and grace to those around us. READ:	Colossians 3:12-14 "Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity."
THINK:	True hospitality begins with cultivating a hospitable attitude. This involves living out the virtues outlined in Colossians 3:12-14. When we clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, and humility, we create an environment where others can feel welcomed. Patience and forgiveness enable us to navigate the complexities of relationships without giving in to judgment or holding onto grudges. Above all, love serves as the foundation of hospitality, binding all these virtues together. Let us daily seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit to grow in these Christ-like qualities and reflect them in our interactions with others.
DO:	Throughout the day, practice being patient and kind with everyone you encounter, <i>even in challenging situations</i> . Seek to understand the perspectives of others and extend grace where it's needed. If there's any unresolved conflict with someone, take steps towards reconciliation and forgiveness, letting love guide your actions. Record any observations below from those encounters.

Day 40: A Legacy of Hospitality

READ: 1 Corinthians 16:14 "Do everything in love."

Romans 12:13 "Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality."

Read Acts 2:42-44 and see how the early church practiced community and circle any words or phrases that speak to showing hospitality and community living.
